

# Letter from our Superintendent Revd Stuart Wild

Dear Friends,

One of the most controversial Sundays of the year is Mothering Sunday. It is held in great affection by many, but for all sorts of reasons, others are less enthusiastic. Mothering Sunday has transformed over the years. Now it is largely a secular occasion where cards, flowers and gifts are exchanged.

However, it originated in the 16th century to encourage people to return once a year to their 'mother church' on the fourth Sunday in Lent in order to renew their faith. Refreshment Sunday as it became known developed because the visit to church was often followed by a visit to the family home after church, with a 'mothering cake', wayside flowers and other small tokens.

In the USA, Mother's Day originated in 1908 after an American woman called Anna Jarvis chose to honour her own late mother. In 1914, US President Woodrow Wilson made a proclamation establishing the second Sunday of May as the official date for the observance of a national day to celebrate mothers. Having heard about this, Constance Penswick Smith established a movement to promote Mothering Sunday in England, collecting and publishing information about the day and its traditional observance throughout the UK. The movement established Mothering Sunday as a widely observed day throughout the British Empire

There is a rather different celebration of Mother's Day in Serbia where it is marked in December, and forms one of a trio of commemorations including Children's and Father's Day on consecutive Sundays. On each occasion, the subject is tied up with rope - Majka (mum) stays tethered until she agrees to supply treats to her children!

Whatever your view on the 2024 version of Mother's Day, it is surely right to give thanks and pray for those blessed with the calling of motherhood; to commend to God those for whom it is a difficult time because they have not been blessed in this way and for those who mourn their mothers and their children. Above all it is a time to give thanks and celebrate the churches and communities who nurture us and our faith as we seek to grow as disciples.

#### **BENEDICT'S RULE FOR LENT**



St. Benedict was a 6th-century monk who wrote a rule of life for his monastic community, which is still followed by many religious orders today. It offers guidance for anyone who wants to live a more spiritual and disciplined life.

During Lent, St. Benedict encouraged his followers to practice prayer, fasting, charity, and reading. He taught them to offer their Lenten sacrifices with joy and gratitude, not with gloom and resentment; with moderation and prudence rather than with excess. *The Rule of St. Benedict*, offers a splendid piece of advice to live our Lent joyfully: "We should stop thinking of our own sufferings and remember what Jesus suffered."

We have been shocked and saddened by the sudden and early passing of Mandy Laird-Hall. Mandy had attended Church Road since her childhood, growing up in the Sunday School and Youth Fellowship and later participating in our church life with her son Oliver. In 1993 she established the Emily Laws School of Acting (ELSA), encouraging confidence and love of performance in generations of young people in the town. Recently, she had been fulfilling the role of lay worker at South Shore and The Drive Methodist churches, where she had been bringing her natural enthusiasm, her faith and her care for other people to those communities.

With her larger-than-life personality, her infectious laugh and often ridiculous sense of humour, Mandy has contributed so much, not only to our churches in this circuit, but to the wider community through her talent for amateur dramatics and her encouragement of young people.

Over 300 people attended her funeral at Church Road on 12 February in a moving tribute in words and music to a remarkable person.

We remember Mandy with affection, remembering also in our prayers at this sad time all her friends and family, especially Mandy's wife Stacey, son Oliver, brother Gary, sister Yvonne and all their families.

#### PALM SUNDAY - Jesus enters Jerusalem

"The disciples went and did as Jesus had instructed them. They brought the donkey and the colt and placed their cloaks on them for Jesus to sit on. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, while others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of him and those that followed shouted, 'Hosanna to the Son of David!' 'Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!' 'Hosanna in the highest heaven!'"

(Matthew 21:6-9).

#### **MONDAY** – Jesus in the Temple

"And Jesus entered the temple and drove out all who sold and bought in the temple, and he overturned the tables of the money-changers and the seats of those who sold pigeons. He said to them, 'It is written, 'My house shall be called a house of prayer,' but you make it a den of robbers'"

(Matthew 21:12-13).

#### **TUESDAY** - Jesus talks with His disciples on the Mount of Olives

"Therefore keep watch, because you do not know on what day your Lord will come. But understand this: If the owner of the house had known at what time of night the thief was coming, he would have kept watch and would not have let his house be broken into. So you also must be ready, because the Son of Man will come at an hour when you do not expect him"

(Matthew 24:42-44).

#### **WEDNESDAY** - Judas makes an agreement to betray Jesus

"...the chief priests and the teachers of the law were looking for some way to get rid of Jesus, for they were afraid of the people. Then Satan entered Judas, called Iscariot, one of the Twelve. And Judas went to the chief priests and the officers of the temple guard and discussed with them how he might betray Jesus. They were delighted and agreed to give him money. He consented, and watched for an opportunity to hand Jesus over to them when no crowd was present" (Luke 22:2-6).

#### **MAUNDY THURSDAY - The Last Supper**

"While they were eating, Jesus took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying, 'Take it; this is my body.' Then he took a cup, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and they all drank from it. 'This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many,' he said to them. 'Truly I tell you, I will not drink again from the fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it new in the kingdom of God.' When they had sung a hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives"

(Mark 14:22-26).

#### GOOD FRIDAY - Jesus is condemned to be crucified

"It was nine in the morning when they crucified him. The written notice of the charge against him read: the king of the jews ... With a loud cry, Jesus breathed his last. The curtain of the temple was torn in two from top to bottom. And when the centurion, who stood there in front of Jesus, saw how he died, he said, 'Surely this man was the Son of God!'"

(Mark 15:25-26, 37-39).

#### **HOLY SATURDAY** - The Sabbath is observed

"The women who had come with Jesus from Galilee followed Joseph and saw the tomb and how his body was laid in it. Then they went home and prepared spices and perfumes. But they rested on the Sabbath in obedience to the commandment" (Luke 23:55-56).

#### **EASTER SUNDAY – HE IS RISEN INDEED!**

"Very early on the first day of the week, just after sunrise, they were on their way to the tomb and they asked each other, 'Who will roll the stone away from the entrance of the tomb?' But when they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had been rolled away. As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man dressed in a white robe sitting on the right side, and they were alarmed. 'Don't be alarmed,' he said. 'You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here. See the place where they laid him'" (Mark 16:2-6)

# A Sunday in the Life of Church Road Methodist Church



It is early on a winter's Sunday morning and all is peaceful and quiet.

If we look around, we see one of the **flower ladies** has been in yesterday, and arranged some beautiful fresh flowers at the front of the church, to enhance our worship. If it is a Holy Communion service, the **Communion Stewards** will also have been in the day before to prepare the elements – crisp

white cloth on the table, wine in glasses, chalice and plate at the ready, and baskets for the used cups at each side.

At the back of church, the window display is looking lovely, and so is the Prayer Transept, thanks to our creative '**Display Team'** (not the sort who ride motorcycles in breath-taking formations...)

The silence is broken by a ping and several whirrs as the heating system kicks into action. This is because **somebody** has programmed it to do so – and changed the settings when necessary.

Around 9.30am, the **Duty Steward arrives**, via the Hub. The **rota person** has already drafted the Stewards rota, having sought information from the stewards as to when they are or are not available. If the **Stewards** haven't

already been in to move the chairs from 'Bumblebees' configuration into worship set-up, they do it now, possibly by themselves until the **Assistant Steward** comes.

The **coffee rota person** arrives at the front door and the Duty Steward lets them in. The Steward has also put the refreshment tables and chairs out if there has been time. The coffee person sets out all the cups, ensures there is enough milk and prepares the biscuits etc. Oh - and switches the boiler on!

In come the **door stewards** to welcome all those coming to worship with a smile and a greeting. That person is unfamiliar – they had better alert the stewards to a newcomer!

Meanwhile the **Stewards** have checked the toilets are clean and supplied with sufficient 'consumables', set glasses of water out for preacher and reader, and switched the required lights on. As worship time draws near, they light the candle on the table.

The **sound engineer** wheels the console out of storage and wires it up. (This will continue until we have the money to build it into a proper sound desk) They prepare the mics for the preacher and reader and carry out 'testing, testing, 1,2,3'.

As the congregation arrives, they may find some copies of the monthly notices or quarterly Record available. These will have been compiled and edited by our **Publications Team** (yes I have just made that name up – they know who they are!) mainly from material passed onto them by **others**.

The **projectionist** sets up their laptop. They have already prepared the slides for the service, including hymn words, Communion service words as required, and any additional images, videos or sound clips required by the preacher. The **rolling news person** has already updated those slides, including any relevant notices, and sent them to the projectionist.

The **JKids Teachers and Helpers** enter, possibly via the Hub, to set up the material and activities that they have prepared in advance for an unknowable number of children and young people!

The **Reader** arrives and ensures the right Bible or their own printout is ready for them on the lectern.

(Others have already drafted rotas for sound, projection and readers.)

The **organist** arrives, or the **band**. We don't have a resident organist so the **organ rota person** has already scoured qualified people they know to fill all the

vacant slots. If it is a week for the band, the **musicians** have already been in to set up their kit. Both will have practised the songs we are to sing.

The **preacher** arrives (**Duty Steward** breathes a sigh of relief – if the preacher doesn't turn up, it's down to them to lead worship!). The Stewards welcome them and show them into the Vestry, if they wish. They resolve any last minute queries about the arrangements.

At about 5 minutes before the start of the service, the preacher and Duty Steward go into the Vestry to pray.

Then the service starts, and it all proceeds as if by clockwork (hopefully!), including a Steward bringing the offertory forward for dedication, and the Communion Stewards showing people, row by row, when to walk up to receive the bread and wine.

At the end of the service, the **tea/coffee servers** spring into action. A **steward** asks the preacher what they would like to drink, and the rest tuck in.

The **flower person** wraps them up and identifies a deserving person to receive them this week.

After the service, the **Duty Steward** collects the offertory and any other donations. Later, the **counting and banking team** will input the amounts onto spreadsheets under the appropriate headings and take it all safely to the bank. (Fingers crossed the cashier comes to the same total!). They then send the completed spreadsheets to the **Treasurer**. (Our Treasurer is not even a member of this church. They are also Circuit Treasurer. We need our own Treasurer to take over in the next few months)

If anyone has noticed an issue with the fabric of the building, a Steward will notify the **Property Steward** as soon as possible. (Our **Property Steward** is not even a member of this church; he is also a Circuit Steward. We need our own Property Steward to take over in the next few months)

As people finish their refreshments and chats, and the cups and glasses are being washed up by the **coffee servers** - usually **many people** help put the chairs back ready for the **Bumblebees Team** and their customers, and put the coffee tables and chairs away, so the cleaners (external) can do their job properly. Thanks folks!

Finally, the **Duty Steward** extinguishes all lights, checks the toilet again and bolts the main doors. They exit via the Hub, checking lights and toilets etc there.

The heating has clicked off. After all the bustling activity, some seen - some behind the scenes, peaceful silence returns to the church.

Would you have imagined that so many different people were involved in our regular Sunday worship? A small army is engaged in both preparation and delivery – but there are gaps in the ranks. Could **YOU** join up to help sometimes?

My day involves, building relationships, with not only those who walk through the doors but also with the volunteers. It is a two-way process and building trust does not come easy to those who find themselves in vulnerable situations, or who may have felt betrayed by those they have trusted in the past. They could have been wary of me being employed by "the Church"; they could wonder if I am going to try and "convert them". But don't get me wrong, that would be amazing!

Whilst I have been in post, I am learning the importance of the art of "listening" to show empathy and compassion and over the weeks, I am seeing that the clients are now coming over to sit with me and are sharing some very difficult conversations. I have also realised in such a short time that these facilities are much needed; they create a warm and safe environment for all who come through our doors.

Should anyone like to come and have a cup of tea/coffee with me, I am in Wesley's on Tuesdays and Friday from 9 am till 2 pm. I would love to see you!

I am grateful for the opportunity to serve as a "Befriender" and look forward to continuing to serve the Church in this way. For me, the chorus from Singing the Faith 699: God of Justice, says it all:

We must go, live to feed the hungry,
Stand beside the broken, we must go.
Stepping forward, keep us from just singing,
move us into action
We must go.

# **Time Out**

Continuing into advent, Time Out members helped to deliver approximately 200 bags around the church boundary as part of the Christmas Light project. It was therefore a great privilege for the group, to launch the event at 7pm on 10<sup>th</sup> December –

The annual Christmas Social for Time Out members and their families was attended by 30 guests in total. The movie theme seemed to go down well, as did the buffet! Picture and music rounds, cryptic quizzes, action games and taste challenges were all thrown in the mix. This evening of shared fellowship is always such a special time, allowing us to draw together afterwards in a time of quiet prayer before the usual

chaos resumes!

We are so grateful to all the families involved for their ongoing support and encouragement: provision of resources, sharing of their time and talents, taxi driving...... we could go on ..... put simply "thank you" for helping us to help these wonderful young people to grow and enabling their light to shine.

A short time later and it was time for the



young people to share the light, as they met together 23<sup>rd</sup> December prepare the Christingles compete in more games over hot chocolate before returning Christmas Eve to distribute the Christingles during worship.

The theme of Light in the Darkness carried through last year's advent liturgies, the Light Project and the Christingle service, being further carried forward into the new year as we visited the Chapel in the Fields, Altrincham for a day's retreat led by Rev Kevin and Jane Johnson. 7 of our 12 young people were able to attend and fully participated in all that was asked of them with caring and open hearts and minds. They shared in time of personal reflection and prayer within the Chapel, outdoors on the Trans Pennine Way and through creative medium within



the workshop. Outreach in terms of preparation for the 2024 Christmas Fayre was also thrown in the mix (nothing like a bit of advanced planning!).

The day drew to a close as we gathered together, using the products they had created in



worship and prayer.

We cannot thank the congregation and church members enough for this opportunity. It was a very emotional and uplifting day that no amount of words could give justice to. As a church we should be so proud of each and every one of them and give thanks for the true blessing they are to our church family.

As for the spring and summer what's to come .... our theme continues to build from Christmas as we move from darkness and light to explore peace, love, hope and joy... through movies, creative expression, intergenerational work, sport and more!



# Christian Aid Week Appeal 12 - 18 May 2024

Please pray for the work of Christian Aid and give as generously as you can.


